


## Common Spiderwort Tradescantia ohiensis







Spiderwort, is a perennial herbaceous plant that is native to Florida. Linear

leaves are up to 15 inches long and arranged alternately on the stem. Showy blue to violet flowers are borne on long stalks up to 3 ft. tall, catch these in the morning though as the petals fade by the hot afternoon. May bloom from March through September in Florida.

Spiderwort is often found at the edges of woods, moist prairies, disturbed areas and along roadsides. It performs best with moist soils, but persists readily on non-irrigated sites throughout Florida. Several *Tradescantia* sp. are commercially available. Spiderwort is fairy pest resistant and extremely low maintenance.

Blooms are readily visited by pollinators. While this is an easy plant to maintain and enjoy year after year, it can also be a bit difficult to control. It is a regular weed for some in landscapes and pastures!
