
North Florida Livestock Show and Sale Beef Record Book

I. Introduction


- a. Tell what type, breed, weight, etc., of steer you got, and why you chose a steer as your project.

- a. Were there things you wish you had known prior to this project, if so, what were they?
- b. Day-to-Day Care: briefly describe what your daily care consisted of –feeding routine, exercise, etc. including some of the Good Production Practices you used in raising your steer.
- c. What was your most significant experience? What did you learn about yourself and/or your steer? Was there anything that surprised you about this project?

III. Summary

a. What would you change or do the same the next time you begin a steer project? For example: different feed, different breed, age of steer you would start with, etc.
