WORKING TOGETHER

October, November, December 2020

The St. Johns County Board of Commissioners and UF/IFAS Extension work in a cooperative effort to provide relevant programming to citizens throughout the County. Covid-19 shuttered many businesses around the world beginning in April 2020; however, our facility remained open with limited public interaction. Although our extension delivery shifted from in-person to mostly online programming, Agents adjusted and served our clientele needs during this unusual time. During the fourth quarter of 2020, Extension Agents and Staff recorded approximately **3,301 contacts** with clientele that included emails, phone calls, office visits and field calls. Agents conducted **40 on-site visits** (Agriculture, Horticulture, Schools, Livestock, and Forages) to assist residents one-on-one in St. Johns County. Below are a few examples of impacts reported by our Agents during this quarter.







- Although 99% of artichokes consumed in the US are grown in the western USA, our Commercial Ag Agent provided a presentation to the Florida State Horticulture Society titled "Globe Artichoke Variety Trials Using Controlled-Release Fertilizer in Northeast Florida." By evaluating varieties, she has not only been able to demonstrate that artichokes can be grown in NE Florida, which varieties work best for our environment, and the effect of controlled-released fertilizers.
- With excitement, our Family Nutrition Program was able to re-engage 454 youth on topics such as nutrition and food safety. We were also able to provide support and materials for teachers for our school garden projects.
- Two-hundred 3rd grade youth and their teachers from Julington Creek Elementary gained knowledge related to the UF/IFAS 4-H Embryology program by participating in an online introductory class provided by our 4-H Department. Thirty-four chicks were hatched in their classrooms where youth were able to see each stage of embryo development. Once hatched, they chicks were donated to a member of the Putnam-St. Johns County Farm Bureau where they will be used as laying hens.

- Our Commercial and Production Agriculture Agents
 provided pesticide education to interested clientele in St.
 Johns County. Participants were able to gain continuing
 education credits needed to maintain their restricted-use
 pesticide license or use these classes to prepare to take
 their pesticide exams.
- The Commercial Ag Agent and St. Johns County Extension Staff proctored **17 pesticide exams** on the 2nd and 4th Friday of each month. By taking these exams, participants who pass can apply for a pesticide license through the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.
- Our St. Johns County Horticulture Agent partnered with a St. Johns County Librarian to provide monthly "Edible Gardening in St. Johns County" interviews to educate county residents on how to grow vegetables, herbs, and fruit trees. Topics included cool season crops, alternative fruit selection and frost protection.

- The UF/IFAS Extension, St. Johns County Horticulture and 4-H departments partnered to create a **Thanksgiving Greenery Contest for 4-H Youth**. Agents created a video to educate about native plants and demonstrated techniques for creating a centerpiece from native plants. https://youtu.be/vCYB1xuU8C8
- The St. Johns County Ag Agents (Christian, Prissy & Tim) assisted the Putnam-St. Johns Farm Bureau Board members with a tour of the HAEC facility and local farms for the Young Farmers and Ranchers committee from Colorado on December 1st. Participants were able to see and learn how commercial row-crop farms operate in NE Florida.
- Our Production Agriculture Agent along with UF/IFAS
 Extension Agents from Putnam, Flagler and Lake Counties conducted two "Living on a Few Acres" virtual workshops on Cool-season Forages and Toxic Weeds in Pastures.

 Participants gained basic knowledge related to these topics and were able to interact with speakers using virtual technology.

The St. Johns County Board of County Commissioners provided a proclamation that October 4 – 10, 2020 be identified and celebrated as National 4-H Week. Our County along with hundreds of thousands of 4-H members and alumni throughout the United States celebrate this week to honor the commitments made through 4-H.





- Our Commercial Ag Agent conducted two demonstrations trials, funded by SJC BOCC, that incorporated two new alternative crops to the HAEC Cowpen Farm rotation: green beans and pumpkins. Over 1,000 lbs of pumpkins were donated to farmers for their agritourism efforts.
 Beans were gleaned by a non-profit group which supported hungry families in need.
- Nine (9) participants graduated from the 2020 Master Gardener Volunteer Training program, which provided over 50 hours of education and hands-on training.
 Participants will donate 75 hours of volunteer service during their first year as MGVs to educational gardening programs and projects throughout the county.
- Two Cool-Season demonstration projects were installed to evaluate plant varieties and planting methods.
 Growers who manage livestock can use this data to make management decisions.
- One on-farm strawberry demonstration was established at a local potato farm in November to determine if this crop could be part of a bean-potato-berry rotation for the TCAA. Agents work with our growers to identify alternative crops that can be successfully grown in our region.
- The UF/IFAS Extension, St. Johns County Extension Office is pleased to announce that Allie Anderson joined our team on December 14, 2020 as a member of our 4-H Youth Development Department. Her program areas will include plant and animal sciences as well as many other areas related to her department.
