WORKING TOGETHER

October, November, December 2022

The St. Johns County Board of County Commissioners and UF/IFAS Extension work in a cooperative effort to provide relevant programming to citizens throughout the County. During the fourth quarter of 2022, Extension Agents and Staff recorded approximately **4,829 contacts** with clientele that included emails, phone calls, office visits and field calls. Agents conducted **41 on-site visits** (Agriculture, Horticulture, Schools, Livestock, and Forages) to assist residents one-on-one in St. Johns County. Below are a few examples of impacts reported by our Agents during this quarter.







- Our Production Agriculture Agent teamed up with UF
 Historic St. Augustine, Inc., the Florida Ag Museum,
 the St. Johns County Cattlemen's Association, and
 the Florida Forestry Service to provide an educational
 program "Florida Heritage Livestock and Agriculture
 History" by exhibiting livestock at Ribera Garden in
 Downtown St. Augustine to more than 250 participants.
 These participants learned how cattle and horses were
 introduced to the United States and how the cattle
 industry began when Ponce de Leon arrived in Florida in
 1521. This may have been the first-time cracker cattle have
 been in downtown St. Augustine in more than 100 years.
- Our Family and Consumer Science Agent provided 4
 home food preservation workshops on water bath and/
 or pressure canning classes for 37 participants, increasing
 knowledge of food safety practices, food preservation
 techniques, and the benefits of preserving food at home.
- Fifteen (15) youth participated in the **4-H Pumpkin Project** and gained knowledge about harvesting, agribusiness, entrepreneurship, food safety and culinary arts. They also participated in hands-on learning opportunities led by St. Johns County Extension Agents and concluded their project by hosting a pumpkin stand at the "Growing Local in St. Johns County" program where they raised \$800 to be put back into the program for next year.

- With the assistance of Farm Bureau and Florida
 Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services
 (FDACS), our Commercial Agriculture Extension
 Agent helped to support the nomination of the next
 County Alliance for Responsible Environmental
 Stewardship (CARES) award recipient, Mr. Dan Corey of
 DeLee Produce.
- Our St. Johns County Horticulture Agent taught Green
 Industries Best Management Practices (GI-BMP) to
 15 students at First Coast Technical College. This
 training is required for anyone in Florida who applies
 fertilizer commercially to apply to the Florida Department
 of Agriculture and Consumer Services (FDACS) for their
 Urban Landscape Commercial Fertilizer certificate.
- One (1) Healthy for Life® class, led by our Family and Consumer Science Agent, reached 7 individuals, providing hands-on cooking experiences or demonstrations to teach new skills for heart healthy living and lifestyle choices.
- Of the 45 farm tour participants, led by our Commercial Agriculture Agent at the Growing Local in St. Johns
 County event, 20 of them completed the survey. They reported a 100% knowledge gain of SJC agriculture, and 100% of the farm visitors stated that the tour either inspired them to start purchasing local produce, or to utilize a wider range of vendors that supply local produce.
- Our St. Johns County Commercial Agriculture Agent and Ag Center Staff proctored 34 pesticide exams on the 2nd and 4th Friday, and 4th Wednesday of each month in the fourth quarter.











- The annual **St. Johns County Master Gardener Volunteer recognition luncheon** was held in December to thank and honor our volunteers who contributed over 8,913 hours of volunteer service in 2022, as well as to recognize those who have reached 5-, 10-, 15-, 20-, and 25-year milestones of volunteer service.
- For its sixth year, our 4-H Department hosted its annual **St. Johns County 4-H Gingerbread House Contest**. This year, forty-eight (48) youth entered the contest. Entries included thirty-three individuals, three teams, and one 4-H club entry. By participating in the challenge, youth put their creativity to work while developing engineering, problem-solving, and teambuilding skills.
- Twenty-three (23) participants attended the Livestock
 Education and Certification for Law Enforcement
 (LECALE) program that was co-taught by our Production
 Agriculture Agent. Participants learned how to evaluate
 cattle and horses for body condition scoring and common
 animal husbandry practices conducted on ranches
 in Florida.
- At our newly developed "Growing Local in St. Johns County", our Master Gardener Volunteer program generated funds to benefit the UF/IFAS Extension St. Johns County Botanical Gardens, and other elements of our horticulture programming at a two-day plant sale.
- Fifty-four (54) attendees took part in the St. Johns County
 4-H Holiday Craft Teaching Night where youth and adult volunteers partnered in teaching a variety of crafts. This event enabled members to develop their communication, public speaking, problem-solving, creativity and decision-making skills.
- The Hastings Triage Lab provided diagnostics for 15 crop and soil samples during the fourth quarter.

- More than 50 participants attended the Mid-Atlantic
 Crop Management Workshop in Ocean City, Maryland
 and gained knowledge related to using unmanned
 arial systems (UAS), otherwise known as drones, for
 commercial purposes, co-taught by our Production
 Agriculture Agent. Several participants have already
 signed-up to attend our next workshop that will prepare
 them to take the FAA Part 107 General Knowledge Exam so
 they can obtain a license to fly drones.
- Our St. Johns County Master Gardener Volunteer program
 provided a **Greenery Centerpiece** workshop to 24 St.
 Johns County residents. This annual event is a favorite that
 educates about using native and local greenery to make
 festive table centerpieces for the holiday season.
- Our Family and Consumer Science Agent hosted a 4-part Food Systems in Series for 76 individuals about how to grow and prepare sorrel, the FL 4-H Food Challenge, Food Forests and Vegetable gardening.
- The surplus strawberry plants used for the hydroponic demonstrations were distributed to 8 school gardens or youth projects in Putnam and St. Johns Counties with the assistance of 4-H Agents, Master Gardeners and Putnam/St. Johns County Farm Bureau Women's Committee members.
- The St. Johns County Horticulture Department hosted the **District IV Garden Clubs fall meeting** and presented "Gardening for Health and Wellbeing" to the 105 attendees.
- As a result of the officer training workshop, led by our 4-H Agent, 100% of historians, reporters, and secretaries understood their job at a 4-H club meeting, feel ready to serve as a club officer, and will use what they learned.
