Ready for spring planting? We are, but let's not be too hasty!

While the weather feels like it should be spring the last few days, we aren't there completely yet! Seeding or putting plants in the ground right now may not be advised, but we are getting close!

A great option if you are impatient like me, is to start your veggies by seed indoors so that once the weather conditions are right, you can plant them in the ground, giving you a head start. Not only is this cheaper than buying transplants, but you will find there is a great selection and variety of plants available to you.

If you are new to this, timing is everything when it comes to seed starting. If you start seeds indoors too early or late, you may find they are ready at the wrong time or they provide a weak harvest. It is recommended to consult the <u>UF/IFAS Vegetable Gardening Guide</u> to see recommended dates on planting various vegetables. To start seeds indoors, you will need to look backwards about 4-8 weeks and start the process then.

You will need to purchase a few items to start your seeding including a seed starting tray, a "seed starting" or germination soil mix, seeds, labels, and spray bottle for wetting the soil. Trays typically come in 72 cells, but also 50 or less. While not specifically needed, a cover for the tray helps to regulate and maintain moisture for the seeds. A grow light is also recommended, since indoor lights do not provide the necessary light spectrum that plants need to grow.



I do recommend pre-moistening the soil before you fill it in the cells, so it won't dry out the seeds. You will need to consult with the seed packet or the UF Gardening guide for how deep to plant your seed in the cell. If you accidently add one or two more seeds in a cell, don't worry. As they start to grow, you can thin these extras out and replant them in a new cell. Once you plant all seeds, use a popsicle stick or similar label to identify what you just seeded, because if you are like me, you probably will forget what seed you planted by the next week. Cover up your seeds gently and use the spray bottle to provide some extra moisture to the cells. Put the cover on the tray and set the tray under your grow light.

At this point, you will need to monitor the moisture of the soil, making sure the tray isn't too wet, but doesn't dry out completely as well. Give it a few weeks and you should see your new seedling start popping out of the soil!
