Fall Rain Barrel Workshop Saturday September 28th 10:00 am.

By collecting and storing rainwater, you can save money, improve the health of your plants, and protect the environment. Rain barrels provide the Florida homeowner with over 50 gallons of free water for their landscape each time it fills up. You can connect additional rain barrels or install an underground cistern to store even more. In addition to saving homeowners money on irrigation, rain barrels also help reduce stormwater runoff that can contribute to flooding and erosion.

You may attend two ways: General Admission with Barrel to take home (\$75 includes barrel) or Without Barrel- Listen and Learn Only (\$5 includes class information only). Register at Rain Barrel Workshop on Eventbrite.

Companion Planting and Succession Gardening Saturday, October 5th at Jarboe Park. The event is free

Learn all about companion planting and what science says. In addition, learn how to plant so you have a continual harvest all season long.
