



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4H TIDBITS

March Wildlife Happenings

Birds

- •Migrating birds from Central and South America visit the state.
- •Mourning doves nest now through November.
- •Carolina wrens are nesting now.
- •Summer tanagers and greatcrested flycatchers arrive to breed.
- •Listen for newly-returned chuck-will's-widows calling after sunset.
- •Plant columbine, coral bean, and other wildflowers to attract hummingbirds.
- •Wild turkey and quail begin breeding in central and north Florida.
- •Quail are breeding in many parts of the state

Mammals

- Look for red foxes emerging from remote beaches.
- •Striped skunks are fighting over mates watch out!

Amphibians

•Male frogs and toads move to ponds, streams, and ditches to breed during rainy nights

Reptiles

•Snakes become active and move to favorite feeding areas

Fish

- •Gulf of Mexico Sturgeon spawn in the Suwannee River during the spring or early summer.
- •Largemouth bass spawning throughout Central & north Florida
- •White bass run up the Ochlockonee River above Lake Talquin.

Hunting and Fishing

•Spring turkey hunters take to the field

Plants & Trees

- •Chicksaw plum and crabapples bloom in north Florida
- •Bromeliads flower in S Florida

March Gardening Guide What to Plant

Annuals/Bedding Plants: Dianthus and other cool-season annuals continue to flourish. Consider planting warm-season annuals such as angelonia, wax begonia, and zinnia at the end of the month.

Bulbs: Plant dahlia, canna, and gloriosa bulbs for spring and summer flowering. Provide stakes as needed to support growth.

Herbs: Consider growing edible ginger. Plant rhizomes in well-drained soil in full to part sun.

Vegetables: Begin planting warm-season crops, such as beans, tomatoes, squash, and corn, early in the month for late spring harvest. Protect from frost.

What to Do

Azaleas: Prune azaleas when they have finished blooming to reduce their size and improve their form.

Shrubs and trees: Prune when the dormant season ends and new growth begins.

Palms and shrubs: Fertilize palms, azaleas, camellias, and other ornamental shrubs if needed. Choose a fertilizer in which at least 30% of its nitrogen is slow release.

Irrigation: Check your sprinkler system for problems such as broken or misaligned spray heads.

Age divisions are: Clover Buds (5-7) years old), Juniors (8-10 years old), Intermediates (11-13 years old), and Seniors (14-18 years old).

All winners will receive a ribbon the same day and a trophy at the end of the 4-H fiscal year. County Events winners will advance to compete at District Showcase.

Senior 4-H'ers (ages 14-18) winners at District will advance to 4-H University, held at the University of Florida Campus in July.

Forest Ecology

Each year, 4-H youth from across the state to test their knowledge of Florida's forests. Six contest stations enable youth to test their identification skills, compass skills, and knowledge of forest ecosystems.

Juniors and Intermediates will compete in the following 4 stations: Tree identification, Forest Health, Forest Ecosystems, and Map Symbols. Seniors will compete in these 4 stations: Tree identification, Forest health, Map symbols, and Forest Management. We will not be covering Plant identification, Tree height, Wildlife, or Compass skills, and we will not have a Quiz Bowl.

Educate: utilizes online learning sessions paired with discussion sessions to prepare students to launch and execute a business.

Sessions are for youth who are just getting started or need a refresher on their business plan.
