Timber Production Meeting held at Extension Office

On November 18, landowners met together to hear about herbicide options and timing, wildfire mitigation options, insect and disease detection, and assistance programs due to hurricane damage. Attendees had an opportunity to hear from our County Forester, Jared Beauchamp along with the Madison County Forester, Zach Butler and the Suwannee County Forester, Jacob Earnest. The importance of choosing the correct herbicide for the type of pine trees planted along with the weeds that are being targeted was stressed to ensure efficacy of applications and considering the cost associated with chemical applications. Along with hearing information presented, the participants were able to hear from each other about management practices and decision-making processes.

Annual Farm Judging Contest a success

On Friday, November 8, 2024 the Lafayette County Extension Office hosted the annual farm judging contest. There were 67 4-H and FFA members from Lafayette, Suwannee, Gilchrist, Taylor, Dixie, and Madison counties that came to participate in the contest. The first portion of the day was spent evaluating animals and commodities based off industry standards and guidelines. The evaluation classes were Beef Heifers, Market Swine, Laying Hens, Dairy Heifers, corn, peanuts, hay, tobacco, and silage. The evaluation portion is based on individual work but scored with a team. The second part of the day was spent in an individual contest called Farm Manager. In this contest, members must correctly identify weeds, insects, feeds, and tools that are important in agriculture and then take a general agricultural knowledge test. The members were able to then have a time of fellowship and getting to know each other with a pork sandwich lunch. It was a great day with beautiful weather for an outdoor event! In the last couple of months leading up to the contest, these teams have spent many hours preparing by learning about industry standards for the animals and commodities they would see as well as how to properly evaluate them. This is not an easy task considering the wide array of animals and commodities. These kids and their leaders are taking a snapshot at many different facets of agriculture and while having a broad knowledge base is important- it is more difficult to learn about so many topics rather than just having a narrow focus. This contest of course teaches the members about agriculture, but it also allows for them to be part of a team, use critical thinking skills, and see a commitment through. As in most cas-

es, being involved in and educated about agriculture naturally engages those skills that are going to have positive impacts on these youth forever.

We are very thankful to those that participated in the contest and to those that helped make it happen. Many people were involved in the gathering and delivering of the animals and commodities for use on the day of the contest.

Agriculture and Weather Report

We continue with this pattern of a rainfall deficit that we have seen over the last couple of months. Take precaution to irrigate winter gardens to ensure a successful crop. Gardens can be planted with coolseason vegetables like cabbage, collards, beets and broccoli and herbs like parsley, thyme, sage, dill, garlic, and cilantro. This extremely cold start to December also is a reminder to winterize your irrigation


