Nonspring flowering shrubs and trees can be pruned now to improve form if needed.

Gary Keyes and Johan Heijkoop named 2023 Lafayette County Farm Bureau Farm Family of the Year

At the Lafayette County Farm Bureau meeting on Monday, December 11, Gary Keyes and Johan Heijkoop and their families were the guests of honor in order to recognize them for being the Lafayette County Farm Bureau Farm Family of the Year. This award recognizes producers that exhibit agricultural excellency with environmental stewardship as a guiding principle. The Lafayette County Farm Bureau has a challenging task when voting on the nominees which come from the Lafayette County Extension Ag Agent, Emily Beach, as the farmers in Lafayette County are ever mindful of producing the highest quality commodities through research-based practices. The Board certainly didn't miss the mark with this election though, the Keyes-Heijkoop team represent everything this award encompasses.

A working relationship started in 2006 when Johan worked part-time for Gary at Milk-A-Way Dairy in Webster while working as a loan officer at Farm Credit. The partnership began in 2011. They started farming at Ronnie Land Dairy in February of 2012. The management style of rotational grazing fit the set-up of both Milk-A-Way Dairy in Webster and K&H Dairy in Lafayette County.

The herd has been bred by 100% Artificial Insemination for over a decade. This allowed the heifers to be registered with the respective breed associations. Both farms are a majority registered Holstein herd. The replacement heifers are raised off farm and brought back as springers. The effort put into selecting quality traits when choosing the AI breeding bulls has improved the herd through the cow generations. Both Gary and Johan enjoy following cow families and seeing the improvements. For 25 years, Milk-A-Way Dairy has housed animals for 4-H youth that started the 4-H Dairy Project with a heifer and needed a place for her to milk as a cow. The farm also works with 4-H clubs and FFA chapters with the Florida Dairy Heifer Lease program.

Gary and Johan saw an opportunity in 2021 to purchase Lafayette Dairy. This opportunity allowed both farms to be in Lafayette County. To move a dairy farm and its families is a daunting task, but they were extremely successful. This decision also benefited the county by keeping two dairies in the county operational preventing yet another vacant infrastructure and this allows farmland to continues to be productive.

They are enjoying the opportunity to grow crops for silage and feed a total mixed ration at Milk-A-Way Dairy. The freeze of 2022 and Hurricane Idalia have added to the challenges of dairy farming. Through a strong partnership, Ag community support, and a strong team of employees, both Milk-A-Way and K&H Dairies are persevering. The resiliency that they have displayed has been an encouragement to those that know them and they provide a great example for the generations that will follow in their footsteps.

These families are also an asset to the community as they immediately became involved in charitable events, supporting the local FFA chapter and 4-H club, and contributing to the overall economy of Lafayette County. Congratulations to the Keyes and Heijkoop families!




