Lafayette County Peanut Production Meeting Held

On February 27 producers gathered at the Mayo Community Center to hear from UF specialists concerning updates and information from the research being done in peanut production. The first hour of the meeting was an opportunity for pesticide license holders in Florida to receive a continuing education unit (CEU) towards their license and then dinner was provided by Mayo Ag Sales and Florida Peanut Federation for the attendees. After dinner, Jonathan Crain spoke about cost-share opportunities and important updates from the Suwannee River Water Management District. We then heard from Dr. Barry Tillman about peanut varieties that have been proven to be disease resistant as well as highyielding through various trials on-farm as well as at UF research facilities. Dr. Nicholas Dufault discussed plant disease management for peanuts and offered a great deal of information about choosing the appropriate spray program to minimize negative impacts from fungi and disease pressure during the growing season. Last but certainly not least, Dr. Kevin Athearn provided market history and outlook on the commodity and the factors that impact profitability. A theme of the night was finding ways to reduce inputs due to cost and a suggested way to do that is to rotate crops in order to lessen disease pressure and use market information to drive decision making.

Attendance at these types of meetings prove that producers are doing everything possible to stay informed with current industry information in order to produce food in the most affordable yet abundant way. The conversations that farmers have with one another and specialists prove to be invaluable time and time again.





Weather and Agricultural Report

We had a couple of days with nearly 2 inches of rain each day in the middle of the month and then with the warm weather, it seems as though our plants are thinking it is spring. I might would agree but I always want to throw caution that there is typically a frost before Easter so keep that in mind when you are thinking about planting and pruning. For planting, March is a good time to get warm-season vegetables (beans, corn, tomatoes, and squash) in the ground but if we have a frost you will need to take some precautions if you know a frost is coming up. Practices that will help protect your garden during a frost are: watering your garden well before the freeze and then during the freeze will protect the roots, flowers, and buds acting as an insulator; covering the rows with cloth, or straw; and/or covering individual plants with cups or buckets. For pruning, for plants that have a spring bloom you want to hold off on that until spring_bloom is over. If you prune too

early, your plants will be susceptible to that cold weather and it will cause damage.

Commercial producers in our county are gearing up for making decisions about crop selection and some have already begun planting. Watermelons are being planted through the next few weeks as well as corn for silage and grain during the month.

Early March is the time for applying herbicides to your lawn to stop the growth of those pesky warm season weeds. If you have questions about what herbicide is appropriate for your turf variety, feel free to contact Emily (386)294-1279.

Lafayette County 4-H understands the importance of providing local youth opportunities to learn skills necessary for a lifetime of success. One of these opportunities is public speaking. The 2023 Lafayette 4-H Chick Chain

What you need to know to participate:

- Clover-Buds, Junior, Intermediate, and Senior 4-H members are eligible to participate.
- Participants should have their chicks by April 1, 2023
- Participants are responsible for obtaining and purchasing their chicks from vendor of their choice.
- Breeds that are acceptable to enter in the program include: <u>Rhode</u> <u>Island Reds, Australorp, Barred Rock, Leghorn, Wyandotte, Orping-</u> <u>ton</u>.
- Participants will learn poultry nutrition and care, communication skills and record keeping.
- Youth will raise chicks for 20-24 weeks prior to shows.
- Lafayette County 4-H will have two opportunities to present their raised hen: 1) Lafayette County Chick chain show, 2) Tri-County Chic Chain Show Madison.
- Youth interested in participating will need to contact the Lafayette County Extension office to be registered in the program.
