Time to Register for the 2024-2025 4-H Year

With summer now behind us, it's time to register for the new 4-H year. Enrollment for the 2024-2025 4-H year has officially begun. The 4-H year runs from September to August, providing a full year of enriching activities and learning experiences.

Lafayette 4-H offers a variety of after-school clubs, including five ongoing ones. In addition, there is the Light House School Club and Spin Clubs, which are available for limited periods throughout the year and are typically geared toward older youth.

August is a testament that there can be a varying amount of rainfall amounts in our very large county. Flooding continues to be a major concern in certain areas but hopefully that will recede quickly in the coming weeks. Har-

vest season is beginning so please continue to be patient with farm equipment on the highways- they are working to feed our nation and deserve appreciation, not frustration for a slower ride to your destination.

September is the month for planting strawberries through mid-October (see article) and the time to get the fall garden established. Fall vegetables include arugula, beans, beets, broccoli, Brussell sprouts, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, celery, collards, kale, lettuce, mustard, onions, radish, spinach, squash, and turnips. Be sure to go by the Lafayette County Library and check out what seeds they have available.

This is a good time to separate any bulbs or perennials that have grown too large. Be sure to add plenty of fresh organic matter to the new planting areas and ensure they have an ample amount of water.

This is the last month that you should apply fertilizer to lawns, consider using a fertilizer with a slow-release Nitrogen component to optimize on those benefits for a longer period of time.

Lafayette 4-Her Participates in Florida Hog and Ham Program

Lafayette Intermediate 4-H member Justin Swinson Jr. recently took part in the Florida 4-H Hog and Ham Program, a notable statewide 4-H program that offers an in-depth experience in pork production and valuable life skills.

This comprehensive program guides participants through the entire process of raising and processing pork. It begins with selecting a feeder pig and nurturing it until it reaches the optimal weight for harvesting. Throughout this period, 4-H members keep detailed records on various aspects such as feed amounts, costs, health care, and the pig's growth. These records are essential for understanding the financial and logistical aspects of livestock management.

Once the hog is harvested, participants are involved in processing the meat into different cuts, curing the hams, and preparing bacon and sausage for smoking. This hands-on experience not only teaches practical skills but also emphasizes attention to detail and quality control.

The program culminates in a retail comparison project where participants assess the market value of their products compared to others. Additionally, each participant completes a detailed record book and presents their experience and findings to fellow 4-H members. This final phase is designed to enhance public speaking and presentation skills.

Justin has found the Hog and Ham Program to be a standout experience in his 4-H career. He highlights that the program is not only a rewarding educational experience but also an opportunity to develop essential life skills such as responsibility, time management, and financial planning. Moreover, the program offers insights into potential career paths in agriculture and meat processing, making it a valuable stepping stone for those interested in pursuing careers in these fields.

Justin is enthusiastic about encouraging his fellow 4-H members to consider participating in the Hog and Ham Program in 2025. He believes that the skills and knowledge gained through this program are incredibly beneficial and can lead to exciting opportunities both personally and professionally.






Growing Strawberries At Home

Strawberries do well in North Florida when planted during the dates of September 15-October 15 when temperatures are between 50°F and 80°F and day lengths are 14 hours or less. Strawberries grow best in a location that receives at least 8 hours of direct sunlight per day. They love our well drained soil and prefer it to be slightly acidic (pH 5.5–6.5). It works well to build up a bed to encourage that well draining environment and then the strawberries can be planted in double rows. The built up bed could be in raised beds/boxes or just in rows that have been built up in your existing garden. Although this is the recommended practice- strawberries can also be grown successfully in containers and tower gardens. The University of Florida recommends incorporating two pounds of 10-5-10 fertilizer with micronutrients, especially boron, per 10 feet of row. For irrigation, the most efficient choice is a drip irrigation tape laid in a 2 inch deep trench down the middle of the bed. A soaker hose is another good option for bed gardening. Drip tape or soaker hose irrigation can be purchased from any outdoor or gardening supply store and ensures that the water goes to the root system of the plant with minimal waste and leaching. Another good practice when growing strawberries, but not one that is a must, is to place a cover on top as a way to control weeds and keep the fruit from lying directly on the ground.

When your beds have been prepared and you are ready to plant you can choose to plant transplants that are bare root, plugs, or containerized transplants. If you use bare root transplants, they will initially need frequent overhead sprinkler irrigation for

the first two weeks after planting- a general rule is from 10am-5pm. Plugs and containerized transplants don't require the sprinkler irrigation because their root system has stayed intact. An important point about planting strawberries is to not set the transplant too deeply (covering the crown) or too shallowly (leaving roots exposed). When plants are established, keep the beds moist. This can be accomplished by watering for an hour each event. Irrigation events should increase during periods of warmer weather and when plants are larger and producing fruit. Flowering and fruit production generally begins in November and is not constant because it can be interrupted by freezing weather. You will know that your fruit is ready to harvest when it has that bursting color of red amongst the green leaves! Gently hold the fruit between your thumb and forefingers to snap the stem by twisting at the wrist ever so carefully to not bruise or damage the fruits of your labor.

To care for your strawberry plants you should protect them from freezes, diseases, and insects. If air temperatures are expected to drop below 32°F the most practical thing to do is cover the plants with sheets, blankets, or frost cloth securing the corner in the late afternoon before the expected freeze. During the growing season, it is also important to control diseases by applying a protectant fungicide spray, removing old leaves, and scouting for insects regularly.

Because the highest quality fruit are produced on relatively young plants with not more than four or five branch crowns, plants are usually removed at the end of the fruiting season, and new plants are planted the following fall starting the fun all over again!
