








Winter, spring, summer, fall ... we change clothes each season because of the changing weather. How hot or cold it is outside helps us decide what clothes to wear.






Trace the name of people wearing uniforms and then say it out loud. Good grooming is important to help us look and feel our best.






Good grooming also means washing your hands when they are dirty. Look at these pictures. Circle the best time to wash your hands.

Women who live in India wear saris (sar-ē). A sari is a cloth that is wrapped around the body to make a dress. Men who live in India wear the dhoti (do-tē). Dhotis are similar to pants. They also wear turbans, or small black hats on their heads. The colors of saris and dhotis may identify different religions.


People who live in Mexico wear a special head covering called a sombrero (sum-brer-o).

A sombrero is a broad-brimmed hat made of straw or

felt. It is worn for protection from the sun.


People who live in the Netherlands wear sabots (sah-bōtz). This is a heavy wooden shoe. Some of the shoes are leather with a wooden sole. The klompen is a sabot that is shaped and hollowed from a single piece of wood.






Native Americans wore moccasins made of buckskin. Other clothing was made from animals that they hunted in the regions where they lived.






In China, men and women wear straw hats with a turned-down brim. The hat protects them from the sun while they are working in the fields.




