Angel Wing Begonia Begonia 'Argenteo-guttata'

Angel Wing Begonia is one of a large, diverse group of shrub-like perennial begonias that branch readily and whose stems do not have the woody, bamboo-like appearance that cane-like begonias do. It is a hybrid between B. aconitifolia and B. coccinea. Cane-like begonias often have erect stems resembling bamboo, which is where they get their name. Cane begonias are known for their highly asymmetric, pointy, wing-shaped leaves, although there are many exceptions. They are known for their foliage, which is often shiny, hairy, colorful, or dotted. Flowers are typically small, appearing in red, pink, and white.

Uses: butterfly garden; pollinator garden

Origin: native to Florida

Height: 1 to 2 feet **Spread:** 1 to 3 feet

Plant spacing: 3 to 5 feet

Light requirement: full shade to part shade

Soil tolerances: sandy loam; very well drained

Drought tolerance: low

Soil salt tolerances: none

Invasive potential: not invasive

Pest resistance: no serious pests
