Brown-eyed Susan

Rudbeckia triloba

Brown-eyed Susan differs from black-eyed Susan which has smaller but more numerous flowers. It can be grown from seed started indoors in early spring or sown directly in the garden after the last frost. You can deadhead spent flowers to encourage additional blooms, which also prevents any unwanted self-seeding. Attracts bees, butterflies, and other pollinators.

Type: herbaceous biennial

USDA hardiness zones: 4 through 8

Uses: mass planting; cut flowers

Origin: native to Florida

Height: 3 to 5 feet**Spread:** 12 to 18 inches

Plant spacing: 12 inches

Light requirement: full sun to part shade

Soil tolerances: sand; clay; loam; silt;

high organic matter

Drought tolerance: good

Soil salt tolerances: unknown

Invasive potential: aggressively reseeds

Pest resistance: no serious pest or disease
