## Gloriosa Lily

## Gloriosa superba

Gloriosa Lily blooms stunningly from early summer into fall on spreading vine-like tendrils so it will need some support such as a shrub or trellis. The vines die back in the fall but will reemerge each year. The plant is not technically a lily, but a member of the crocus family. If ingested all parts of the plant are poisonous to people and animals. The plants are not dangerous to the touch but can be fatal if ingested in a large enough dose.

**Type:** perennial

**USDA hardiness zones:** 8 through 12

Uses: specimen; container

**Origin:** not native to North America

**Height:** 5 to 6 feet **Spread:** 1 to 3 feet

Plant spacing: 6 to 12 inches

**Light requirement:** full sun to part shade

Soil tolerances: sand; high organic matter

Drought tolerance: good

Soil salt tolerances: moderate

**Invasive potential:** can be invasive

Pest resistance: subject to aphids,

anthracnose, viruses,

bulb rot
