Twinflower

Dyschoriste oblongifolia

Twinflower is commonly used in the landscape as a ground cover and has pretty flowers that are quite striking when closely observed. These plants have a relatively open habit and should be closely spaced in order to cover an area effectively. The Twinflower will grow well on acidic, well-drained, sandy soils and prefers a sunny or partially shaded location in the landscape. Twinflower, as the name implies, has paired lavender flowers that occur throughout the year; the heaviest bloom is in May. This ground cover is native to pineland areas in the southeastern United States and will tolerate considerable drought.

Type: perennial herbaceous

USDA hardiness zones: 8 through 11

Uses: ground cover

Origin: native to Florida

Height: 6 to 12 inches

Spread: depends upon supporting structure

Plant spacing: 24 to 36 inches

Light requirement: part sun to part shade

Soil tolerances: sand; loam; clay; acidic to

slightly alkaline

Drought tolerance: high

Soil salt tolerances: poor

Invasive potential: not known to be invasive

Pest resistance: no serious pest or diseases
